Welcome to the 2022-23 Outcome Health Annual Report.

The 2022-23 financial year was another successful one for Outcome Health. With the shadow of COVID now largely behind us, we have seen continued growth and progress.

While we were all personally impacted during lockdowns, as a healthcare organisation, we continued to work on the frontlines of the pandemic through our data, research, and mental health services. Our staff maintained a positive and forward-looking attitude, supporting the community and each other during these unprecedented times.

Our mental health programs persisted throughout COVID, with our Ambulance Mental Health Nurse team handling thousands of calls from people in mental health crises. The program has not only continued to thrive but has also led to a re-contracting with Ambulance Victoria for several more years.

Our Mental Health Nurses continued their excellent work in GP practices, universities, and clinics, with much of our work transitioning to remote telehealth services. While many of these clinics will return to face-to-face operations, telehealth is expected to remain prevalent and normalised, especially in the mental health space, meeting the expectations of our consumers.

POLAR produced a range of new reports examining disease-specific cohorts and updating our older dashboards. Data security remained a significant concern, and we conducted annual security and penetration testing to identify and rectify any vulnerabilities.

In January, the NHMRC and ATO formally recognized the 'Aurora Primary Care Research Institute' as our primary research entity, as we continue to formalise and raise the profile of our research work under 'Aurora.' We also maintained valuable partnerships with universities such as Macquarie and Monash, ensuring that our governance and ethics processes remained sound through organisations like RACGP, our Data Governance, and PHN governance committees.

As we emerge from the shadow of COVID and make further adjustments to how we work, communicate, and collaborate, I want to express my gratitude to all staff for their positive approach and commitment to maintaining high standards on a daily basis.

On a personal note, in August 2022, I stepped down from the CEO role at Outcome Health. It has been a privilege to lead and grow the organisation into a high-performing and community-minded company that has genuinely made a difference in the care of people in Australia. We welcomed Dr Shainal Nathoo to the organisation as our new CEO. Shainal brings with him a wealth of experience and a vision for future growth and expansion.

With our distinctive blend of research, clinical services, health intelligence, and data systems, we remain committed to serving our diverse stakeholders and meeting the needs of our communities. It has been a pleasure working with the dedicated and hardworking members of our board and the Outcome Health team.

CLINICAL SERVICES

Outcome Health's Clinical Services: Empowering Community Resilience

Outcome Health's Clinical Services have played an indispensable role in supporting our community during another challenging year. As a not-for-profit organisation, we remain committed to expanding our mental health support services. This year, we expanded our innovative initiatives such as Indigenous Mental Health support, collaboration with universities, and embedding mental health clinicians with Ambulance Victoria. We also continued our partnerships with General Practices to deliver comprehensive mental health care throughout the Gippsland region.

Expanding Mental Health Support

Our services have been unwavering in assisting the community in building strength and resilience as we navigate the post-COVID-19 era. Our tailored healthcare responses have been a lifeline for many individuals, ensuring reliable and high-quality services during these turbulent times. With clinicians stationed in over 23 locations across Gippsland and surrounding regions, we continue to empower healthcare providers and others to deliver individually directed collaborative mental health care.

Partnership with Ambulance Victoria

Our ongoing collaboration with Ambulance Victoria (AV) has been instrumental in supporting Victorians with mental health concerns. Our expert staff has played a crucial role in triaging individuals calling triple 0 for emergency assistance. This unique and customised service offering involves embedding mental health nurses within Ambulance Victoria, working in close partnership with ambulance staff to deliver a highly valued service.

Nurse Coordinated Clinics in General Practice

For over two decades, Outcome Health has been delivering specialist nurse-led clinics, focused on diabetes, asthma/respiratory care, and complex health management to individual practices on a fee-for-service basis. This enduring commitment to improving healthcare at the grassroots level underscores our dedication to enhancing the well-being of our community.





2022/23 continued to provide POLAR with opportunities for growth and partnership. Western Victoria PHN fully integrated onto the platform, and our work in the Victorian Priority Primary Care Centres (PPCCs) saw Murray PHN join the POLAR family, meaning that POLAR is now in every Victorian PHN.

This year also saw the partnership with Telstra Health formalised through the integrations with Medical Director Helix and Communicare. Both integrations promise to allow POLAR to innovate and move into new sectors through new FHIR Application Programming Interface (API) technologies and Indigenous Health reporting.

On the information security front and after a wave of high-profile data breaches, POLAR again increased its investment in security through additional penetration and brand protection testing. A strategic decision was also made to transition from the Institute of Standards and Technology (NIST) Cyber Security Framework to the ISO27001 accreditation standard. ISO27001 will be in place by early 2024 and connects nicely with our other work on enhancing identity management to secure the platform further.

In October 2022, Outcome Health was announced the winner of the Qlik ANZ 2022 Excellence in Providing Better Community Outcomes with Data Award for its continued and dedicated efforts in designing, developing and deploying POLAR. POLAR was recognised as a critical business intelligence solution to support Commonwealth-funded Primary Health Networks (PHNs) and other community health providers.

The first module of the Business Report has been released for review and focuses on appointment servicing. The appointment servicing view promises to be the first in many business modules to offer POLAR customers another use case for using the platform. Patient flagging/commissioning was introduced to address the problem practices, and PHNs have in identifying patient cohorts outside the Clinical Information System. Use cases are endless; however, this functionality can help both Practices and PHNs keep track of MyMedicare registrations in the interim.

Throughout 2022/23, POLAR has been inundated with projects to enhance the platform. Our project calendar is booked six months in advance and is testimony to our reputation and ability to deliver projects that benefit the primary care sector. The good news is that 2023/24 looks to be following the same trajectory.



Aurora has continued to drive a robust research platform underpinned by PHN engagement and solid relationships across the sector. The breadth of activity across Aurora has enabled Outcome Health to contribute to the richness of the evidence base rapidly expanding primary care research landscape in a way which delivers findings of interest to general practice and enhances patient care.

Ethics

In 2023, the POLAR platform was granted a five year ethics extension by the National Research Ethics and Evaluation Committee (RACGP). The ethics approval covers the processes and systems for collection, transfer and storage of general practice data across the POLAR platform. Individual research projects leverage the current ethics approval ensuring that all research facilitated by Aurora is conducted according to the highest ethical standards as stipulated by the National Health and Medical Research Council while importantly, being in line with community expectations.

Research portfolio

Primary care is the gateway to the Australian heath system. Analysis of data captured during the general practice encounter provides an earlier and deeper insight into health status than any other health data source. The unique contribution general practice data makes to advancing medical knowledge is demonstrated in the breath of research areas investigated across Aurora including:

- Stroke;
- Dementia;
- Viral Hepatitis;
- People with lived experience of disability;
- Vaccine safety signals;
- Opioid prescribing patterns;
- Long COVID;
- Hospitalisation risk reduction;
